NEWS OF THE MORNING.

In our columns to-day will be found several pro jects of laws which have been presented to the attention of the Legislature, including an Act to regulate the rate of interest on money, and to prevent usury; an Act to authorize guardians of idiots and lunatics to receive and remove from this State any property to which said wards proceedings, which will be noticed on our first page, will be found a report and series of resolutions on the subject of School Lands, and other matters of general interest.

G. Rabbo, who was convicted in December, 1855, of rape, at Stockton, and sentenced to the Penitentiary for ten years, has been pardoned by Governor Weller, unconditionally. It appears that the Judge before whom he was tried is not now satisfied of his guilt; and the District Attorney who prosecuted the case says, that he thinks he was not guilty and ought to have been acquitted; respectable citizens of Stockton, also, judging from subsequent events, express the same opinion. From a careful examination of the papers, Governor Weller is satisfied that the prosecution was gotten up to extort money, and that the party has been unjustly punished.

The sale of stamps yesterday, at the State Controller's office, amounted to the sum of \$574 76. Certificate of incorporation was filed yesterday, in the Secretary of State's office, by the Knickerbocker Tunnel Company, of Tuolumne.

The amount of treasure forwarded to the East from this State, during the present month, is \$3.848.267 17.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.

The Committee on Public Lands, in the Senate, made an interesting report yesterday in connection with the subject of the School Lands, which, with the resolutions accompanying, as amended and adopted, we print among our minutes of the session. An Act relating to the rights of husband and wife was reported back from the Judiciary Committee with amendments and recommendation that it be passed. After some debate, the title was amended and the bill ordered to be engrossed for a third reading. An Act concerning divorces which the Judiciary Committee unanimously recommended should be indefinitely postponed, was laid temporarily on the table : a synopsis appears in our minutes. The Act concerning evidence was taken up and the Assembly amendment concurred in. Assembly resolution for a committee to examine the condition of the State Treasury, was taken up, and, after the reading of a message from the Governor on the subject-an allusion, in which, to the insecurity of the Treasury, "especially whilst the Legislature is in session," created much merriment-the resolutions were adopted, and a committee appointed a bill to regulate the rate of interest on money was introduced, read twice by title, and referred to the Judiciary Committee; a bill relating to property of minors, insane persons and idiots, was introduced, and also referred to the Judiciary Committee. BULKHEAD PLANS .- The San Francisco delegation, to whom have been referred the various Bulkhead or Sea Wall projects of the session, will have no cause to complain of the scarcity of plans. Yesterday two new bills were introduced, one in each branch of the Legislature. The Senate bill, by Mr. Soule, is substantially the same as that known in the last Legislature a Parsons' plan, while the bill introduced by Mr Cherry in the Assembly, is a revised and amend ed copy of the Burr project, a cotemporary of Parsons' bill. As none of the schemes introduced this Winter have been treated with special favor, and may even fail to receive the support of their movers, except in one or two cases, it is difficult to forecast the fate of the Bulkhead plan. Mr. Cherry's bill is believed to do away with some of the objections urged against this

project, submitting, in the first place, the ques tion of "Bulkhead or no Bulkhead" to the people of San Francisco at a general election, that t may be known whether the scheme is popularly demanded, or if its favor only rests in the pockets of sundry speculators.

OFFICIAL MAP OF CALIFORNIA,-One of the San Francisco papers states that frequent complaints are made of the official map of the late William M. Eddy. There is very little question of this fact. Many of the localities are incor rectly described, and great changes have taken place, other than those connected with the pecuiar topography of the country. The paper alluded to, the Times, suggests, in order to save expense to the State in procuring a new map, that the original stone on which Eddy's map was lithographed might be found, and the required changes made with but little cost. We think the idea an erroneous one. We apprehend it would be fully as economical to procure new stone, and if another map is required, reasonable terms might be made with those who are in possession of recent surveys, so that no

great expense would necessarily be incurred. Goddard's map is the best one that has ever been ngraved in this State, although it is on too inute a scale for official purposes. From our knowledge of various localities, we consider it exceedingly accurate.

REVENUE ACT .- The following is a copy of the bill introduced into the Senate on Tuesday, by Mr. Chase of Nevada, to provide for the payment into the County treasuries of the proceeds of certain licenses :

AN ACT supplementary to, and amendatory of "An Act to provide revenue for the support of the Government of this State," passed April

SECTION 1. All moneys received on account of censes for the sale of goods, wares, and mercha Incenses for the safe of goods, wares, and merchan-dise of the classes specified as the 9th class and 10th class in Section 10, of the Act entitled "An Act to provide revenue for the support of the Gov-ernment of this State," passed May 15, 1854, and all moneys received on account of licenses for the sale of liquors and wines, specified in Section 11 of the Act aforesaid, and which licenses for goods, wares and wareheadies and tea license and wines. wares and merchandise, and for liquors and wines, are referred to in Sections 3 and 4, of an amenda-tory Act, passed April 27, 1855, shall be paid into the county treasury for county purposes. SEC. 2. The Board of Supervisors, in and for the

several counties, shall cause to be printed a suffi-cient number of licenses, such as may be required cient number of licenses, such as may be required for the objects and purposes specified in the fore-going section for 3, 6, and 12 months. The Chair-man of the Board of Supervisors shall sign, and the clerk of said Board countersign and number all such licenses as aforesaid, before they are is-sued, and the clerk shall enter the same in the order of their date and number in the record of said Board, which record shall be signed by the Chairman of the Board and clerk. Each license shall contain a blank receipt, to be signed by the County Treasurer on delivery of said license to the purchaser thereof. The Clerk of the Board of Su-pervisors shall deliver to the Treasurer, as many of such licenses as may be required, and shall charge such licenses so delivered to the County Treasurer, specifying their class and character, censes issued, and open a new account with the Treasurer for the next month.
