The Jacksonville Sentinel, of Jan. 14th, has the following notice of rich quartz discoveries :

As yet none of the veins found vie with Hicks' lead, but they may fall far short of this comparison and still be very valuable, for, as we have before remarked, that claim surpasses any that we ever heard of. Last week the two brothers took from the rock crushed in an or dinary mortar, about thirty ounces of gold, and this week they have been eqally successful. The vein has been penetrated only to the depth of from two to three feet, all the way yielding extravagantly as at the outset.

Some pieces of quartz rock were brought to town yesterday by a party of Germans, which were taken from a newly discovered lead in the vicinity of Missouri gulch, on Jackson creek. Not a particle of gold could be seen in them with the aid of the strongest magnifying glasses, but

upon being subjected to the simple crude process here applied of crushing and testing the rock about a dollar's worth of gold was taken from four pounds of quartz. Last night George Ish came to town with sev eral pieces of gold quartz rock of extraordinary richness, taken from a lead discovered by him

mewhere in the neighborhood of Big Bar, yes terday. The rock is white and very hard, with fine veins of gold coursing all through it. He says the pieces exhibited are fair samples, and that the lead is quite extensive.

REPORTED INDIAN OUTRAGES NORTH .-- The North Californian, published at Eureka, Humboldt bay, of January 18th, says :

We are informed by Joseph Sumption that three men (Hitchcock, Buckley and Brown) came across three Indians one day last week, on the north fork of Yager creek, and made an attack upon them. The Indians showed fight, but were at last killed. In the fight Hitchcock was wounded in the hand. One of the Indians had a fine double-barreled English gun, one barrel rified and the other for shot, made by Riley, High street, Holborn, London. Sumption was in town to get sumplies for a party of fifteer or in town to get supplies for a party of fifteen or twenty men, who design spending a couple of weeks in an attempt to put a stop to the contin-ued depredations upon the stock of the settlers. 


