Lassen County Correspondence. SURANVILLE, Aug. 13, 1864. EDITOR APPEAL :-- There are so many rumors affoat in regard to Indian difficulties in Surprise Valley, that I have thought it best to give you the full particulars. There has been no disturbance of any kind with the Indians, until last week, when the house of Vallandigham & Trow was entered. After killing their dog, by tearing down the chimney during the temporary absence of the owners, a ride and ammunition, pair of blankets, west and pants, and other articles, were stolen. Mr. Trow immediately communicated with his neighbors, and it was determined to pursue the thiover. The next evening, after dark, a party of sixteen loft the Valley, and started in the direction of Goose Lake. After traveling some ten miles they came in sight of a camp fire. The party now divided, and Capt, Stout, with his party, succeeded in getting within 50 yards of them without being discovered. and secreted themselves. Capt. Clark, with the remainder of the boys, came up on the opposite side and got within six or seven rods, when they met an Indian leading two horses. Capt. Clark shot him down, and with a yell the baye rushed in. The Indians sprang to their fuel, but only to become better marks for the boys, for they dropped them as fast as they raised. In a few minutes they had possession of the camp, and the Indians, those who were able, had taken to the rocks, where they nept up a scattering fire on the party; but the boys considered it best not to pursue them any further. Most of the wounded got away in the willows, but they found 12 dead bodies and they think there was at least 20 wounded. On the boys' side but one ... C. Rachford was wounded; he was shot in the arm, about two inches from the shoulder. ' The wound was dressed and the bone set by Dr. Porter, and he is now doing well. The following is a list of the spoils: 2 horses, 1 No. 1 rifle, 12 pounds powder, 15 pounds of balls, lots of percussion caps, 7 bullet pouches, 15 deer skins, 1 grizzly skin, 10 bows and quivers of arrows, 1 potato digger, I net 6 feet wide and 200 feet long, and many other articles. They cleaned the camp of all the things stolen from Vallandigham & Trow's house, and also a coat stolen from Mr. Hong about two months ago. Upon examining the bullot pouches, one was found containing lots of arrow heads, and smong them was several gold once. We have in our possession one loaned us by Jarome Trow, of pure gold, one and three-quarter inches long, five-eighths wide, and weighing three dollars. There is no doubt that the country around Goose Lake and the head of Pitt river is rich in gold, and these heads have been picked up and pounded out by the Indians, but as they have always been hostile, the country is almost unexplored. Several parties are talking of going out to prospect this an of country, but I would advise them not to go with less than 25 men well armed, as the Indians are very treacherous. The settlers in the Valley have been trying for some time to have a company of soldiers stationed here, but it seekes the fruit orchards of Chico and the ladies of Mormondom are only entitled to Government protection, while here, where soldiers are actually needed, none can be had. Mr. J. Allen has arrived here, with his train, from Rogue River Valley, and brought 18,000 pounds of flour to the Valley. He intends lecating there permanently. Flour can be bought by the quantity at \$10 per hundred.

Henry Talbert has just fluished harvesting nie barloy. He has fifty acres, and it is thought it will average fifly bushels to the sere.

A voin of coal has been found in one of the cafions near Milk Ranch. Some twenty pounds have been sept in to have tried, and it is prononneed by good judges to be and excellent article. The boys intend commencing work upon it next week, in order to accertain correctly the size and bearing of the lodge.

I would advise all persons who are claiming ranches in Surprise Valley, and who bre now ab sent, that they had better return immediately, as in view of the recent Indian difficulty, it was talked of calling a mass meeting of the settlers in the Valley, and declaring all ranches vacant, without regard to improvements, from which the owner had been absent over 60 days.
