DESPERATE INDIANS QUIETED

We recently alluded to Indian Tom Flat Creek Bill, and two other desperate Indians having shot several horses on Mo . . tion Creek and uttered threats against the lives of several white men. Determined to break up this desperate gang, under Sheriff Wm. Jackson procured warrants for their arrest (Tom being under indict. ment for murder,) and accompanied by several armed men, started for the Indian camp on Squaw Creek on Tuesday night. The party surrounded the camp at daybreak on Wednesday morning and called upon Tom and his companions to surrender, or be shot. Tom started to run for the brush, when Jackson and Fred Hall fired on him, killing him almost instantly. Indian Bill refused to give himself up and Emanuel Marshal shot at him. The ball struck him in the side of the neck, penetrated to the bone, and glanced downward along his spine and came out at the small of his back, not killing him instantly. The other "bad Indians" were not in the camp, having left-a few days previous.

Jackson is entitled to great credit for his prompt and efficient style of dealing with these savages who have long been the terror of the community.

HAS BOUGHT A FARM.
