SHASTA, July 6, 1851. DEAR COL.—This evening another party of fifteen men, who started out some few days since, command-ed by Capt. B. F. Harvey, returned from an Indian hunt. Capt. Harvey informs me that this morning, about 9 o'clock, he made an attack upon some eight hundred Pitt river Indians, on this side of the Sacra-mento, some twenty miles from this place. A warm fire immediately commenced, and was kept up for some considerable time, during which time some sixty or seventy were killed, and a large number mortally wounded. The party captured and brought in four squaws, and one young child about six years old. taken.
