These Indians, it will be remembered, three years ago burned down all of Maj. Bidwell's houses and outbuildings, drove off and killed a good many of his cattle, and also killed a man by the name of Frye, who was at the time employed on the Chico Ranch.

On Christmas night the Soolamseyas and Vimsooyas, both hostile to the whites, came boldly down to the rancheria of Bidwell's Indians, t spend the night in frolic and fun. Notice of their presence was given by one of the Chico Indians, and at an early hour a number of gentlemen went out and surrounded the big house or den where they were, with the intention, not of harming them, but of taking them prisoners and dealing with them according to law and justice. The Indians belong-ing to the Chico rancheria were first separated from the others, and a guard placed at the entrance of the wigwam. It was not long before the Indians from within began firing on the guard without. The first shot took effect on a young man by the name of Shafer, Bidwell's miller. The ball passed

they issued from the den; the result of which was five killed, including the two famous characters above named. This is the story that was told us on the morning of the afray. We heard the groans of the wounded man, and saw the smoking ruins of the pow-wow house, and the bodies of the In-dians, who lay where they fell. These Indians, it seems, were well armed with fire-arms. Yes, the wild Indians of the mountains come down to the plains armed with rifles! We can but deplore the depravity of those who, regard-less of law, sell fire-arms and powder to the sworn enemies of their race, and perhaps, too, the laxity of the authorities in enforcing the law. X.
