The PLACERVILLE LINE IN TROUBLE.—The San Francisco Alta says: The U. S. Infantry, Capt. H. B. Kelley, of the 6th of Octo- ber, which place he left on the 6th of Octo- ber, the mail stage on the Choptenning line, was stopped on the route, and the stock at- tached by creditors at the first station beyond Gravelly Ford, on no money has been paid them since the line started.

The Lieut. was obliged to walk a distance of 80 miles—near Rag Town, to Carson City, over the Sierra Nevada. The passengers and the stage were left a week afterwards, and the Lieut. was obliged to get no farther than Baby Valley, less than half way between Salt Lake and California. Our informant represents the stage as being in the worst condition. They made no accommodations, but were obliged to sleep on the ground in many places, and a tent was reached, it was invariably occupied by employees of the stage line. Finding that the stage would not come through he left and walked, as already stated, and arrived here at least three days ahead of the mail. The stage, when he left it, had made thirty-eight miles in the last forty-eight hours. At Carson City he was obliged to pay a second time to get through.

THE STATE FAIR HUMBOUS.—We have often called attention to the injustice of holding Fairs under the patronage of the State, at points that can be reached but by a few persons; and except at an enormous expense to others, and have made such suggestions in the matter as we thought calculated to remove the difficulty. The following, from the Yreka Union, shows the feeling of some of the "country folks" in regard to traveling. We do not agree, however, with our contemporary in his contempt for the articles exhibited at the Fairs:

The editor of the Hesperian Magazine was disappointed in not having seen more country editors at the Fair. Indeed and deed, ma'am, we, for one, couldn't afford it. It wouldn't pay to travel several hundred miles, and expend several hundred dollars to examine vegetable and animal novelties, and to remark on the lengthening shins, long drawn out, of female equestrians who should be apprenticed to a circus. These Fair contrivances are very good for indigent hotel-keepers in cities, but they are not extensively profitable to our country folks. We wouldn't travel far to see a fancy pin cushion, constructed by a woman too lazy to sew buttons on her husband's shirt, or to admire a precocious bull-calf stuffed with monstrous ruc-bags.

TROUBLE AT HONEY LAKE.—Mr. Belden, the Honey Lake expressman, informs the Plumas Standard (Quincy), of 22d October, that the Indians in the neighborhood of Honey Lake Valley are getting exceedingly troublesome, in ranging off stock. On the night of 14th October, a Mr. Rice, who at the time was in the lower valleys, had 140 head stolen from him. This occurred on Willow Creek. Another party has had 120 head stolen, at what is called Pine Creek, a portion of which were taken while he was in pursuit of the first that were missing.

Capt. Weatherly had returned from the Indian hunt, he having been with the company of Shasta volunteers. It is stated that this company had taken some 12 prisoners, and killed 23. It is the intention of the company to remain in the mountains as long as the weather will permit.

MONO LAKE.—Messrs. Nixon, Braxton and Swift have arrived at Keysville from the above place. A correspondent of the Visalia Delta says: These gentlemen worked a claim they have secured on "Mary's Gulch," just 28 days. They used a rocker cut with an ax out of a pine log, in which to wash their dirt, and realized the snug little sum of \$2,800 between them. They brought the dust with them, and I have seen and handled it.

I see many California celebrities coming in recently, among whom may be noticed Judge C. H. Bryan, of Marysville, and Judge Mott, of the same place; Governor R. M. Anderson and Hon. G. D. Hall, of Placerville, and a number of traders and speculators from San Francisco, Sacramento and Marysville, all of whom intended to locate permanently.

To the Editors of the Pacific Medical and Surgical Journal.—Gentlemen: My attention has been called to an article in the December number of your journal, in regard to the ad eundem degree granted by the Philadelphia College of Medicine to Dr. L. J. Czapka. When the application for the degree was made to the Faculty, it was accompanied by affidavits and testimonials to the effect that Dr. Czapka was a regular graduate M. D. of the University of Pesth, had served as Surgeon in the Hungarian army, and was a regular practitioner of medicine. On the strength of these the degree was granted. The ad eundem degree, as its name implies, is conferred on graduates only, and gives us new privileges. Had there been the slightest suspicion of irregularity, the application would have been refused.
