INDIAN CAMP SURPRISED-SIX "BUCKS" AND THREE SQUAWS KILLED-Under date of May 27th. B. Blockburger, of Hay Fork, sends the Trinity Journal particulars of a recent fight with Indians on the Trinity border, which resulted in nding a half dozen predatory red-skins where they will do no further mischief:

I send you particulars of the result of the late Indian hunt by soldiers from Humboldt panied by citizens of Hay Fork and friendly Indians as guides. The incidents are furnished me by Henry Powell, who has been in the party and on the Indiah trail for the last four weeks About a month ago Sergeant Harris, of Company E, "Mountaineers," with seven soldiers, three citizens of Eel river, and two friendly Indians as guides, followed the Indians to this valley. They then, in company with some citizens from this place, followed them back to Madriver, and have been on their trail ever since river, and have been on their trail ever since, and in following them down near Hiampom were not over one day behind when Ryan was killed. They found the Indians had joined a larger party known as the "big gun" party, and had all gone toward Humboldt. The pursuers kept on their trail and sent to Fort luka for more men, when Lieutenant Greer, with thirty men of the Sixth Infantry, with Lieutenants Hackett and Haiton, of the Sixth, hastened to their assistance with Stephen Flemming as guide; found their camp, and on Sunday night the 15th instant, crept to within one hundred yards, but owing to the thick brush they coul not ascertain exactly where the camp was, and were trying to surround it when they discovered two Indians coming toward them with their guns on their shoulders, seeming to have been on guard duty and just coming in. The men were ordered to make ready to fire, when they discovered that one was a white man dressed in military clothes, and were ordered to hold. The white man having seen or heard them ran to the Indian ranch and cried "waugie," (white man) when they all started. Then commenced a running fight in which six bucks and three squaws were killed and two squaws and two children taken prisoners. The bucks were scalped by the tame Indians, and the band followed some eight miles. Some of them were killed three miles from their camp. After the place was cleared the ranch and contents were hurned. It contained blankets, sacks tents were burned. It contained blankets, sack of old clothing, etc., sufficient to load a four horse team. Ten men were left at their camp to see if they would return, which they did, and another Indian was shot. None of the whites were hit, although they estimate that they were fired at one hundred times. It is supposed that the Indians numbered in all about sixty, and all had guns. The officers and soldiers deserve great credit for following and fighting them through the brinsh for so great a distance. They report that when they left they could see many blood trails where wounded Indians had scaped. One fine horse, with new Spanish addle, was taken—supposed to belong to the

wifite man. Also three guns in good order. FROM ALPINE. - The Chronicle of June 4th

Emptying the shavings out of the mattress that was in the jail, he set them on fire, and came very near sending himself to the old scratch's kingdom. A bucket of water extinguished the fire, and two or three brought him to his senses, as he was almost suffocated. He was discharged next morning from custody, and left town almost instantly.

The Victoria Chronicle of June 1st gives an account of the massacre of McDonald and a party of nine men by Indians, when near Banshee lake. Two friendly Indians informed them that all the whites at the lake, on the Waddington trail, had been murdered, and warned them to turn back. McDonald, disbelieving their statement, continued his course and was shortly met and attacked by a very large body of Chilcootens. The devoted little party could make no effective resistance, and were soon slain and most shockingly mutilated. Indians who warned McDonald of the danger brought the news of this latest massacre to Governor Seymour, at Butte Inlet.

ADVENTURES OF AN ESCAPED PRISONER .- We were yesterday very much interested in a conversation with P. C. Williams, a member of the Ninety-fourth Ohio Infantry, who was captured Ninety-fourth Ohio Infantry, who was captured by the rebels at Chickamauga, and who arrived within our lines at Raleigh Court House a few days ago, having made his escape in February last from the Prison in Saulsbury, North Carolina. After his capture be was taken to Danville, Virginia, from which place he escaped and was recaptured and taken to Saulsbury. After remaining at the latter have for After remaining at the latter place for several weeks he, with others, again escaped by digging a tunnel under the prison. He lay concealed in the woods for six weeks in Rockingham county, North Carolina, during which time he had sev-eral interviews with a Union man who was perfeetly familiar with the whole Southern country and who instructed him how to strike his course through the moustains by the moss and bark upon the trees. He traveled several weeks in the direction of Raleigh Court House, approachng a human habitation only when the absolute mg a human habitation only when the absolute want of food compelled him to do so. When within about a hundred miles of Raleigh Court House, having in the meantime fallen in with a couple of conscripts who were traveling with him, he came suddenly upon three rebel soldiers who were hunting deserters in the woods. Williams and the conscripts were arrested and compelled to march in front of their captors. In the course of a few scripts were arrested and compelled to march in front of their captors. In the course of a few hours the conscripts broke and started to run away. Two of the soldiers started in pursuit, one remaining with Williams. The two soldiers and the two conscripts were soon lost in the woods and Williams and the remaining soldier were marching along alone. When about to cross a stream upon a foot log, Williams stopped under the pretense of fixing his ragged shoe and the soldier got upon the log first. As he did so Williams raised a heavy hickory stick which he had been carrying and dealing the soldier a blow upon the head felled him, musket and all, in the rapid stream. He then took to and all, in the rapid stream. He then took to his heels, and, after a weary march of several days, reached Raleigh Court House, ragged, worn and destitute, but still the happiest man glive.
