It will be seen by reference to a document which we publish this morning, that another inmate of the State penitentiary, Louis Flores, of Marysville, who was sentenced to two years' imprisonment for manslaughter, has become the recipient of Executive clemency, having been pardoned at the expiration of ten months of his allotted term.

MINING ITEMS.

A rich specimen of silver ore has been found in the Forest Mining Company's claim, in Plumas county. It is to be feared that the late and smaller trains will experience more serious trouble from them.

He says that Cecil's train, just below Gravely Ford, on the Humboldt, found a new grave with an inscription on a board, stating that twelve men were buried there, murdered by the Indians. Curiosity led them to open the grave, when they found only the body of an ox.
