CINCINNATI.—Joe Pentland's great circus was in Red Bluff on Saturday evening, and gave one of the best equestrian performances we have ever witnessed in the State. There is no humbug about this circus whatever. The feats of daring horsemanship, together with the various acrobatic and gymnastic performances, are not to be surpassed by any company that may undertake them. The series of evolutions and postures upon horseback by Senor Sebastian and lady are strikingly beautiful as well as singularly reckless of danger. The Orin family know nothing of fear, and realize all that may be imagined of strength, agility and daring. In fact there is no part of the exhibition which is not well done and entitled to praise from the most critical judges of the performances of the ring. Joe Pentland seasons all with the spiciest wit and the jolliest humor. The pavilion was crowded to its utmost capacity on Saturday evening. The circus will be here again on tomorrow evening, when another performance will be given, embracing a new programme.

S. D. GOODALL.—We have refrained from noticing the death of this well known citizen, in the hope that it might turn out that he was among the few saved in the boats that escaped swamping, at the time of the loss of the Golden Gate. But we can no longer doubt that he is in the list of the dead, and can only add our brief tribute of respect for his memory and regret for his death. Mr. Goodall came to this country from Ann Arbor, Michigan, and was going back to his wife and two children in that place, at the time of the fatal disaster. He was about 28 years of age, in excellent health, and with good prospects for the future. He worked in the Beacon office for 19 months, and won for himself the character of a faithful, intelligent, industrious, and competent compositor, as well as general worker in the job and other departments of the office. He made many friends in Red Bluff, and his loss is sincerely mourned. May his friends all meet him in "the land of the dead."

FEDERAL SOLDIERS.—A company of one hundred soldiers—volunteers—under command of D. D. Akey, arrived at Red Bluff on Friday last. The precise object of their being here is not known, but it is given out that they are sent here to keep the mountain Indians in check. They are stationed just across the river, in sight of town. On Sunday last there was insubordination in their ranks, as we are informed, and they refused to obey their Captain. He called them together to test the extent of their ill feeling, and requested all those who refused to recognize his authority to stand aside. All but six or eight stood aside in the manner indicated. The Captain then resigned, and sent his resignation to headquarters. The command is left in the hands of Second Lieut. Davis. The first sign of mutiny, we believe, was manifested in releasing an inferior officer, who had been put in irons by order of the Captain. Probably the authorities below will take cognizance of the matter at an early day.

INDIAN FIGHTING.—We have received the subjoined letter from Capt. Harmon A. Good, dated Deer Creek, August 18th: "We left camp on Deer creek Tuesday last, on Thursday following discovered and routed the remnants, about seventy in all, of the same company of Indians on Mill creek that we had left ten days previous on Antelope, killed four and captured twenty-one prisoners—eleven squaws and ten children; traveled same day to twenty mile hollow; were attacked early Friday morning by Indians, who fired fifteen shots at us. They killed three of our horses and scalped them, but we did not lose any men, killed, wounded or prisoners. We arrived in camp here yesterday, but have not yet received any orders respecting our prisoners. I wonder if we must hunt and keep them in the bargain?"

SPEECH OF SENATOR LATHAM.—On Monday evening last, Hon. Milton S. Latham addressed a large and intelligent assembly of ladies and gentlemen, in front of the Luna House, in this place, on the general issues of the day. It was a very able effort and won enthusiastic applause. His expose of the wholesale robbery of the National Treasury, committed by the Republican officials, under the very nose of the President—millions upon millions abstracted, and the plunderers still kept in high position in the Government—was startling and overwhelming. It filled the scattered Republicans present with dismay, and smote their hearts with awful premonitions of defeat.

COMET.—"The menace of the universe; Still rolling on with innate force, Without a sphere, without a course, A bright deformity on high." [Byron.] One of these strange wanderers of the heavens has been observed from this point since Friday evening last. It may be seen a few degrees to the southwest of the North Star, and is quite large and brilliant.

HUNTING PARTY.—A. J. Moulder, present Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the best State ever had, was in town a day or two ago. He came up from San Francisco with a view of joining a hunting party which is shortly to start for the Coast Range. Col. Washington, Vincent E. Geiger and George Pen Johnston, we believe, are of the party.

It is credibly asserted that the steamer Banner left here on Tuesday for the purpose of making the ascent of Mt. Shasta, but, unfortunately, when last heard from, she was stuck on a small bar in the river a few miles above town.

The next year he won the Gold Cup at "Royal Ascot," and then challenged for the Whip, which he met with acceptance. He now retired from the turf and was imported into the United States
