Re: Nomination of Seth Davis to UC Berkeley Campus Committee

I. INTRODUCTION

On September 23, 2022, UC Berkeley informed the Commission that one of its UC representatives to its campus repatriation committee (Beth Piatote) had resigned and it submitted the application of Prof. Seth Davis to replace her as an urgent matter. Prof. Davis meets CalNAGPRA's requirements for nomination based upon his degree and experience.¹ After reviewing his application and accompanying materials, the UC nominations subcommittee recommends the Commission nominate Prof. Davis to this repatriation committee.

II. PROF. SETH DAVIS'S QUALIFICATIONS

Prof. Davis has served on various committees whose work addresses the sovereignty and human rights of Indigenous Peoples, including the UC Berkeley NAGPRA Advisory Committee (2019-2021) and the UC Advisory Group on Cultural Affiliation and Repatriation of Native American Human Remains and Cultural Items (2019-2021). (Prof. Davis Application, Ex. 1.) He teaches classes on Federal Indian law, including on repatriation. Prior to joining UC Berkeley, he was a professor at UC Irvine School of Law, where his work included assisting in the convening of the 2016 World Indigenous Law Conference, an international conference of Indigenous Peoples to discuss Indigenous law and human rights, including rights to repatriation. He is a co-author of the *Cohen Handbook of Federal Indian Law* as well as scholarly articles on federal Indian law and Indigenous rights. He has filed briefs before the Supreme Court supporting tribes, including California tribes. In addition to this work, Prof. Davis mentored the Commission's law school fellow where they worked on improving repatriation at UC Berkeley.

Based upon his experience in federal Indian law, his efforts to foster repatriation at UC Berkeley and Irvine, as well as his work with the Commission, the subcommittee recommends the Commission approve his nomination to the UC Berkeley repatriation committee.

¹ Specifically, Prof. Davis has a law degree with far more than the required five-year-minimum experience in his field of study and is affiliated with the law school's Native American studies program which includes teaching classes on repatriation. He has also demonstrated an ability to work collaboratively with tribes on issues related to repatriation. (Health & Saf. Code, § 8026, subds. (a)(2)(C) and (d)(A), (B), (2).)

Application to Serve on UC Berkeley Campus NAGPRA Implementation and Oversight Committee

Self-Statement and References

I am honored at the opportunity to be considered by the Native American Heritage Commission as a UC Nominee to the UC Berkeley Campus NAGPRA Implementation and Oversight Committee. As a Professor of Law at UC Berkeley School of Law, and thus a member of the UC Berkeley community, I share in the responsibility of the University to collaborate with Native Nations to ensure the return of Native ancestors and belongings and to fulfill the purposes of the federal NAGPRA and CalNAGPRA. And as a member of the NAGPRA Implementation and Oversight Committee, I would be committed to meeting those moral and legal obligations.

My professional work and service have focused upon the sovereignty and human rights of Indigenous Peoples. I have been admitted to practice law in the United States for 13 years and have been a professor for 8 years. I am a tenured professor at Berkeley Law, where I teach both the core and advanced courses in Federal Indian Law, as well as courses in Tort Law, Constitutional Law, and Federal Courts. My teaching includes both the federal NAGPRA and CalNAGPRA. I am a co-author of the *Cohen Handbook of Federal Indian Law* as well as scholarly articles on federal Indian law and Indigenous rights.

In my work, I have focused upon providing support to Native Nations in litigation concerning Tribal sovereignty and to capacity-building in the area of Tribal cultural resources protection. For example, I regularly file *amicus* briefs in support of Native Nations in litigation before the U.S. Supreme Court, including a recent <u>brief</u> in support of the Cherokee Nation, the Oneida Nation, the Morongo Band of Mission Indians, the Quinault Indian Nation, and the Navajo Nation in *Brackeen v. Haaland*, and a <u>brief</u> in support of the Match-E-Be-Nash-She-Wish Band of Pottawatomi Indians in *Patchak v. Zinke*. In addition, I have <u>represented</u> members of the Bipartisan

Congressional Native American Caucus in litigation to preserve Tribal sovereignty. In my work in the area of Tribal cultural resources protection, I was fortunate to receive a grant from the NAHC to fund the Tribal Cultural Resources Project at UC Berkeley, a two-year project in which my colleague Nazune Menka and I worked to provide capacity-building support to Native Nations exercising their inherent sovereignty to protect their ancestors, belongings, and sacred places.

As a member of the UC Berkeley community, I have worked to create spaces for Native students, staff, and faculty to thrive and to ensure that the University fulfills its moral and legal obligations to Native Nations. In my four years at UC Berkeley, I have been fortunate to work with the amazing members of the Native American Law Students Association. In addition, I have served on various committees whose work addresses the sovereignty and human rights of Indigenous Peoples, including the UC Berkeley NAGPRA Advisory Committee (2019-2021) and the UC Advisory Group on Cultural Affiliation and Repatriation of Native American Human Remains and Cultural Items (2019-2021). Prior to joining UC Berkeley's community, I was a professor at UC Irvine School of Law, where my work included assisting in the convening of the 2016 World Indigenous Law Conference, an international conference of Indigenous Peoples to discuss Indigenous law and human rights, including rights to repatriation.

Dear Members of the Commission:

As of August 15th, 2022 Associate Professor Beth Piatote of UC Berkeley resigned her position as a university member on the UC Berkeley campus NAGPRA Implementation Committee, leaving one spot empty. We would like to move as quickly as possible to fill the vacancy so that the committee can continue to proceed with discussions of current repatriation cases/claims and recommendations on campus NAGPRA processes. We anticipate a surge of activity this semester, since we sent out inventories and summaries to California Tribes and continue to have several claims in preparation for submission. I hope that you will be able to assist us in expediting the process of appointing a new university member.

We consulted the remaining members of the campus Implementation Committee, polled the individuals nominated previously, and contacted potential new UC nominees in the attempt to find someone willing and able to serve. We are fortunate that **Professor Seth Davis**, in the UC Berkeley School of Law has agreed to serve if appointed. Professor Davis is an ideal person to fill this role; his professional legal work focuses on the sovereignty and human rights of Indigenous Peoples with a teaching focus on Federal Indian Law that includes NAGPRA and CalNAGPRA. He has a strong commitment to Native Nations on issues of Tribal sovereignty, and has founded the Tribal Cultural Resources Project at UC Berkeley, with a generous grant from the NAHC.

Seth has played an integral role in the implementation of NAGPRA policy and processes on our campus and in the UC system. He served on the UC Berkeley NAGPRA Advisory Committee from 2019-2020 that was re-formed by Vice Chancellor Randy Katz in order to strongly promote swift repatriation and return of ancestors and sacred belongings. Professor Davis also served on the UC systemwide Advisory Group on Cultural Affiliation and Repatriation of Native American Human Remains and Cultural Items from 2019-2021.

The current NAGPRA Implementation Committee would benefit greatly from his service, and I hope you will give him your consideration.
