Rose completed a BA degree in History with a double minor in Political Science and Social/Ethnic Relations at University of California, Davis and earned a Ph.D. degree in History with an emphasis in American Indian History from Arizona State University. A portion of her dissertation examines the American Indian Historical Society's response to repatriation issues in the San Francisco area. Prior to her position at Sac State, Rose taught at Arizona State University and Northern Arizona University. Wherever she lives, cultivating respectful relationships with local tribal nations is a priority. She has published chapters in *Ka'm-t'em: A Journey Toward Healing, Introduction to Ethnic Studies,* and *Know We are Here: Voices of Native California Resistance*. She has served on the Sac State NAGPRA Advisory Committee since 2022.
