Dr. Kelly Leah Stewart is an Assistant Professor in the American Indian Studies program and a member of the Committee on Native American Burial Remains and Cultural Patrimony (CNABRCP) at California State University, Puvungna (Long Beach). Her research examines acts of agency and survivance by survivors and descendants of the Catholic-run mission Indian boarding school, St. Boniface. In 2021, she joined the *Unmapping UC: Motkoolahooee* project as a Graduate Student Researcher and continues to work as a consultant. Kelly is a co-principal investigator for the *Remembering, Restorying, Reclaiming: A Community-Based Examination of Land Tenure and Public Education Across California* project and coauthor of *From Tovaangar to the University of California, Los Angeles.* She holds a Doctor of Education from UC San Diego and CSU San Marcos, a Master of Arts in American Indian Studies from UCLA, and a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Cal Poly, Pomona. In addition to her work in academia, Kelly had nearly a decade of experience working in Indian Country in the social services sector through a Southern California Tribal TANF program. Through her maternal lineage, Kelly is Gabrielino-Tongva and descends from the villages of Jaibepet and Tobpet.

Dear Honorable NAHC Commissioners,

As the duly elected Tribal Chair of the Juaneno Band of Mission Indians, Acjachemen Nation, I would like to impart the Tribes' vehement opposition to the nomination of Kelly Leah Stewart to the CalNAGPRA CSU Systemwide/Campus Repatriation and Oversight Committee Oversight Committee.

This opposition is based on the fact that Kelly Leah Stewart is not a documented lineal descendant to any California Indian tribe. A full genealogical report is forthcoming. Ms. Stewart has used the claim of Tongva and Luiseno heritage to further her academic career and to misappropriate the California Indian voice.

Ms. Stewart is not the right person for an oversight committee dealing with ancestral remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, or objects of cultural patrimony. Individuals that are nominated for this type of oversight committee should be **thoroughly** vetted for lineal descent to a California Indian tribe and be part of a legitimate tribal entity being governed by vetted lineal descendants.

In addition, one of Ms. Stewart's recommendation comes from Cindy Alvitre (Gabrieleno-Tongva). It is a known fact that Ms. Alvitre is not Gabrieleno-Tongva as she claims (see attached 2013 genealogical report). Ms. Alvitre also happens to be the NAGPRA coordinator at CSULB, in which the NAGPRA/CaINAGPRA collections are in a complete and utter mess. We believe that her nomination of Ms. Stewart is a conflict of interest and a way to collaborate with others falsely claiming Native identity they cannot prove. Ms. Stewart's appointment to this position is contrary to what is required for a position of this caliber.

I will close with a quote from a former commissioner during a 2022 NAHC meeting, "we don't want anyone besides real Native American Indians handing out our ancestral remains and resources". This is a simply put statement but one that resonates with our fundamental values as Native Peoples.

Subject: Public Comment - Chairman Andrew Salas representing the Gabrieleño Band of Mission Indians, Kizh Nation, in response to CalNAGPRA CSU Systemwide/Campus Repatriation and Oversight Committee Updates and Nominations

Dear Honorable NAHC Commissioners,

As the duly appointed representative of the Tribal Council of the Gabrieleño Band of Mission Indians, Kizh Nation, I am writing to formally express our strong opposition to the nomination of Kelly Leah Stewart, Desireé Martinez, and Christine Conley to the CalNAGPRA CSU Systemwide/Campus Repatriation and Oversight Committee. Our opposition is based on the fact that these individuals are not documented lineal descendants of any California Indian tribe. They have erroneously claimed Gabrieleño and Luiseno heritage to advance their academic careers and to misappropriate the voice of California Indians.

These individuals are not suitable for an oversight committee responsible for our ancestral remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, or objects of cultural patrimony. Nominees for such a committee should be thoroughly vetted for lineal descent to a California Indian tribe and be part of a legitimate tribal entity governed by verified lineal descendants. Additionally, Desireé Martinez and others running for this nomination are not California Indians and should be properly vetted according to 25 CFR Part 83(e).

The current progress with the codification of the contact list should not be undermined by adding unvetted individuals to oversight committees, which would then be difficult to remove. It is concerning that individuals such as Desireé Martinez, who claims Gabrieleno/Tongva identity, are on the UC CalNAGPRA CSU Systemwide/Campus Repatriation and Oversight Committee despite lacking genealogical proof of descent from any Gabrieleño ancestor or village site (see attached genealogy). Ms. Martinez has also nominated or written letters of reference for nominees who similarly lack verified genealogical ties to California Indian ancestry.

Furthermore, one of Ms. Stewart's recommendations comes from Cindy Alvitre (Gabrieleno-Tongva). It is a well-documented fact that Ms. Alvitre is not Gabrieleno-Tongva as she claims (see attached 2013 genealogical report). Ms. Alvitre also serves as the NAGPRA coordinator at CSULB, where the NAGPRA/CalNAGPRA collections are in a state of disarray. We believe that her nomination of Ms. Stewart represents a conflict of interest and an attempt to collaborate with others falsely claiming Native identity they cannot prove. Ms. Stewart's appointment to this position does not meet the requirements for a role of this significance.

On behalf of our tribal government, we oppose the nominations of the following individuals due to their inability to adequately demonstrate their claims of California Indian descent and potential conflicts of interest:

- Christina Conley
- Kelly Leah Stewart

Additionally, we express our concerns about the nominations of Dr. Steven R. James and Brend Bowser. Their appointments could potentially cause issues with the repatriation process, particularly at CSU Fullerton, which has a significant collection at risk. I will close with a quote from a former commissioner during a 2022 NAHC meeting: "We don't want anyone besides real Native American Indians handling our ancestral remains and resources." This statement, though simple, resonates deeply with our fundamental values as Native Peoples.

Furthermore, it is essential to note that according to the State of California AJR 96, sponsored by Diane Martinez, there is no historical background for the term Tongva. This further invalidates the claims made by these individuals regarding their heritage and eligibility for these positions.

Public Comment, Joe Castillo, representing the Gabrielinos and true California history, public comment on CalNAGPRA committee nominations

Dear sirs,

I am providing public comment opposing the nomination of several candidates to the CalNAGPRA commission.

I am an independent historical researcher and have written five books on California history as well as author of a weekly column on various historical topics in California. I have also performed an extensive and detailed study and research on determining the origins of the Tongva tribe and name. Based on my 1,100-page research manuscript titled "The Evolution of the Tongva Tribal Name", the "Tongva" name was established in 1992 after being "chosen" by the Gabrielino Band of Mission Indians. My research indicates that the "Tongva" name was a self-chosen, self-identified and self-proclaimed tribal name with no ancestral, cultural, or historical association with the Gabrielinos. Over 161 source documents were examined supporting the lack of evidence that the "Tongva" are the native tribal name of the Gabrielinos. Furthermore, the study contacted members of the Gabrielino/Tongva Nation and the Gabrielino/Tongva Band of Mission Indians and all refused to comment on the origins of the "Tongva" tribal name.

As my review indicates the "Tongva" tribe to be an inaccurate, incorrect tribal of the Gabrielinos tribe with no ancestral, cultural, or historical support, then each tribe using the "Tongva" name should also be considered a questionable and dubious tribe with members who may also be questionable and dubious in their genealogical ancestral records. In 1994, the State of California also found no support for the "Tongva" name during the state recognition review process of the Gabrielino tribe and removed the "Tongva" name from the recognition application. Three other subsequent resolutions submitted to the State of California with the "Tongva" name never made it out of committee review.

As the following candidates are associated with "Tongva" named tribes or have been recommended by "Tongva" tribal members, I strongly oppose the nomination of these individuals as they will be compromising the integrity and ethics of the CalNAGPRA Commission and committees:

- CSU Dominquez Hills, Christina Connelly, Gabrielino Tongva Indians of California
- CSU Fresno, Cristina Gonzalez, CSU Native American Studies Member recommended by Desiree Martinez (Tongva)
- CSU Los Angeles, Adam Loya, Gabrielino/Tongva Nation
- CSU Long Beach, Kelley Leah Steward, Gabrielino/Tongva Nation
- CSU Northridge, John Cody Blunt, Gabrielino/Tongva Nation, recommended by Sam Dunlap (Gabrielino-Tongva Nation)
- CSU Channel Islands, Edgar Perez, Gabrielino/Tongva Nation, recommended by Nicholas Rosenthal and Samuel Dunlap (Gabrieliño/Tongva Nation)

Public Comment, Joe Castillo, representing the Gabrielinos and true California history, public comment on CalNAGPRA committee nominations

Thank you for your consideration in this matter.
