CSU Nominees: Support letters or resume for CSU nominees should include professional experience demonstrating the ability to work in collaboration with Native American Tribes successfully on issues related to repatriation or museum collection management.

Tribal Nominees

A voting member of a California Indian tribe shall be an elder, spiritual leader, tribal leader, or tribal member, as designated by the governing body of the individual's tribe, with a minimum of five years' prior experience in any of the following:

- Repatriation of human remains and cultural items pursuant to federal NAGPRA;
- · Cultural resources protection under Tribal, state, and federal law; or
- Consultation with state and federal entities and agencies.

Preference shall be given to members of a California Indian Tribe. If no members of a California Indian Tribe meeting the qualifications of 8028.71 subdivision (c) paragraph (1) are available, members of other Tribes may serve.

CSU Nominees

CSU Nominees must be affiliated with or employed by the California State University and have the following:

- A graduate degree in any of the following: Archaeology, Anthropology, Native American Studies, Ethnic Studies, Law, Sociology, Social Sciences, Environmental Studies, or History, with a focus in California
 - If there are no candidates satisfying this clause, candidates that have degrees and direct professional experience in fields relevant to repatriation or tribal cultural resources matters shall be deemed to meet the requirements of the clause; and
- A minimum of five years' experience working in his or her field of study.

Preference shall be given to members who have demonstrated, through their professional experience, the ability to work in collaboration with Native American tribes successfully on issues related to repatriation or museum collection management.

In the event that candidates from the California State University are not available or do not meet the above criteria, the California State University representative positions may be filled by retired emeriti of the California State University who meet the above criteria.

Note: At least two CSU nominees to the Systemwide one CSU nominee to the Campus Committee(s) must be affiliated with an American Indian or Native American Studies program

Please consider my application for a position on the Chico State Campus Native American Graves Protections and Repatriation Act Implementation and Oversight Committee. I am an assistant professor in the department of anthropology with professional experience in both archaeology and museum studies. I currently teach in both the Archaeology and Museum Studies program and help oversee the collections at the Valene L Smith Museum of Anthropology (VLSMOA).

At the VLSMOA I have been working with Director William Nitzky and the Office of Tribal Relations at Chico State to execute several NAGRPA related projects. These have included preparing Native cultural items in the museum's care for the implementation of AB 389 and helping coordinate the arrival and future management of a collection of contemporary Native arts that will be stewarded by the Office of Tribal Relations. During the summer of 2023 I began working in collaboration with Dawn Rewolinski, Rachel McBride, Isabel Araujo (a graduate student in the museum studies program), and other faculty in the anthropology department and library a to create a new campus wide NAGPRA policy. I will be continuing this collaboration in the Spring of 2024 during a course release to help complete a draft policy and begin consultation with Tribal members on the final text. My participation on this committee would greatly facilitate my work on this policy document.

Although my personal experience working directly with Tribes has been more limited I have extensive experience in community collaboration in archaeology and museum spaces and experience working with NAGPRA in museum collections. For the past 15 years I have been part of a long-term community archaeology and heritage project at the Amache National Historic Park Site, a WWII Japanese American Internment site. With members of several stakeholder communities we complete archaeological projects that support community interests and collaborate with local groups in the stewardship of a large collection of belonging from the incarceration center. Stewarding these collections has taught me to reconsider the value of traditional approaches in favor of those that recognize community input and alternative ways of knowing. It is this approach that I bring to my relationship with community partners and the items stewarded by museums and other institutions.
