Greetings,

I am submitting my nomination for the California State University NAGPRA Committee to oversee the state and federal Native American Graves and Protection Act compliance efforts. I am applying as a CSU Nominee.

By way of introduction, I am Annette L. Reed, an enrolled citizen of the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation of northwest California. I first began my academic journey in Native American studies in 1980 at San Francisco City College, taking courses in Native American History and Native American Studies. I transferred into the University of California (UC), Berkeley and graduated in 1985 with a B.A. in Native American Studies. I was and continue to be deeply rooted within Native American Community. I completed a Single Subject Teaching Credential and worked as a Native American Resource teacher for Fremont School District for 3 Years. I left to earn an M.A. in History at UC Davis with a focus on California Native people. Following the M.A. degree, I completed a Ph.D. in Ethnic Studies with a concentration in California Indians and Native American History. To my knowledge, I am the second or possibly the third California Native Women to earn a Ph.D. in any area.

In 1998, Sacramento State hired me as a tenure track faculty in the Department of Ethnic Studies and in the Native American Program, where I have worked for the past 26 years. I have maintained a good working relationship with tribes and Native communities in California and have been active in many organizations. As an example of my recognized work at Sac State and within the Native community the following was awarded to me in Sept 2016, on Native American Day at the Capitol:

California Legislature Assembly Resolution – The Central California Tribal Chairpersons' Association, Northern California Tribal Chairmen's Association, Southern California Tribal Chairmen's Association and the California State Tribal Liaisons presented at Native American Day at the State Capitol. In recognition of both this historic event and the 40th anniversary of the Native American Heritage Commission. In recognition of "distinguished" service at California State University, Sacramento as an educator, for community service and promoting the importance of Native American culture and its impact on our nation's history and future. Resolved by Assembly Member Kevin McCarty.

I was surprised and deeply humbled by this recognition. I only offer this as an example, not for any other reason.

In 2003, I joined the NAGPRA Committee in the college of SSIS where it resided until this year. The efforts have been elevated to the Office of the President. My plan is to leave the college committee and be considered as a CSU Nominee. I have demonstrated the ability to work in collaboration with Native American Tribes. I heartfeltly believe in issues related to repatriation efforts, as well as have the academic experience and training to serve as a CSU committee member.

I respectfully request to be appointed as a CSU Committee member.
