Radley is known as a community activist, trainer, counsellor, artist, poet, teacher, husband, father and grandfather. His teachings are grounded in the grass-roots, Indigenous traditional culturally-based human rights movement. He lives in Bella Vista, CA.

Is the founder of the Indigenous Language Network, located in Northeastern California which supports the language and cultural revitalization efforts of the Pit River Peoples. Is the Chair of the Native Coalition for Medicine Lake Highlands Defense, an organization devoted to the sole purpose in the protection of the sacred Sattitla Highlands, located in Northeastern California- recently designated as a National Monument by President Joseph Biden on January 14, 2025. Has spent 40+ years defending the rights of land, of water, of tribal cultural, of biodiversity, and of human beings. Is a Board Member of the International Indian Treaty Council, which is an organization of Indigenous Peoples from North, Central, South America, the Caribbean and the Pacific working for the Sovereignty and Self Determination of Indigenous Peoples and the recognition and protection of Indigenous Rights, Treaties, Traditional Cultures and Sacred Lands. More importantly, he is known a dance regalia maker, canoe carving, bow making and other traditional sharing's. Believes in the traditional teachings from his mother and father's Indigenous spiritual systems and embraces the healing this knowledge use provides.

My name is Gregory Feather Wolfin- *Issi Illmawi* and Citizen of the Pit River Nation. I am an elected representative for the Illmawi Band of the Pit River Tribe. I am enthusiastically writing this letter of support for Mr. Radley Davis. Throughout the years, Radley has contributed much to the Pit River community; the development of tribal culture, refining tribal sovereignty, engagements with community members, advocated to protect sacred sites through tireless work with the Tribe and agencies.

Radley has also founded the Indigenous Language Network, located in Northeastern California which supports the language and cultural revitalization efforts for the Pit River Peoples. Radley is currently the chair of the Native Coalition for Medicine Lake Highlands Defense, an organization devoted to the sole purpose in the protection of the sacred *Sattitla* Highlands, located in Northeastern California- which has recently been designated as a National Monument by President Joseph Biden on January 14, 2025. Radley has spent 40+ years defending the rights of land, of water, of tribal cultural, of biodiversity, and of human beings.
